Jack-o'-Lantern



The Jack-o'-Lantern tradition has its origins in Irish folklore about a shrewd but wicked man named Stingy Jack. Jack famously tricked the Devil on multiple occasions, securing promises that his soul would never be claimed by Hell. However, because of his deceitful and sinful life, Jack was firmly refused entry into Heaven when he died.

Bound by his promise, the Devil likewise denied Jack access to Hell, upset that the trickster had outsmarted him. Instead, the Devil mockingly gave him only a burning ember from Hell's fires to light his perpetual journey. Jack quickly placed this single coal inside a carved turnip he was carrying, creating a makeshift lantern. He was thus doomed to wander the dark Earth endlessly, becoming known as "Jack of the Lantern," which was ultimately shortened to "Jack-o'-Lantern." Early Irish people carved scary faces into vegetables like turnips to ward off his lost spirit from their homes.
